In March, 211 new lists were issued versus an average of 184 per month for the previous 12 months. Of these lists, 81 (or 38%) were announcements older than six months; nine were announcements between 518 and 1,463 days old. Among the reasons for the age of these 81 lists were: awaiting the result of a Merit System Board decision, receiving amended announcements and other circumstances outside the Division of Selection Service's control.

 $_2$ The Online Application System ("OAS") began accepting applications on March 7, 2011. There were 54 announcements with issue dates between March 7 and March 31, 2011, of which 20 (or 37%) were issued with OAS capability. As of April 25, 2011, the Civil Service Commission has received 718 applications for these 20 announcements.

³The Civil Service Commission resumed meeting on January 19, 2011, after a three month hiatus due to a lack of quorum. The increase in pending written record appeals is the result of re-assigning 230 temporary layoff appeals from consideration as Hearing Matter items, which involve the Office of Administrative Law (OAL), to being written record appeals, which go before the Civil Service Commission without OAL involvement.

 $_4$ The number of State Titles only includes those titles in the Executive branch of State Government. As of March 31, 2011, there are 459 titles assigned to the Judicial and Legislative Branches of State Government that the Civil Service Commission maintains on behalf of both branches; however, the authority over the consolidation and/or elimination of those titles rests with the branches themselves. The reduction of 14 State titles is the result of the elimination of nine titles and the consolidation of five non-title compensation codes into the base title.
